



**Otfried Jarren**, born in 1953, is a professor of media and communication science at the University of Zurich. From 1989 to 1997 he taught journalism (media and communication science) as well as political science (comparative politics) at the University of Hamburg as a full professor. Otfried Jarren directed the Hans Bredow Institute for Media Research at the University of Hamburg from 1995 to 2001. Since 1997, he has taught and conducted research as an ordinary professor at the IPMZ – Department of Communication and Media Research at the University of Zurich – which he directed from 1998 to 2008. Furthermore, he was Vice President of the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences and a member of the Board of the University of Zurich from 2008 to 2016. Since 2016, Otfried Jarren has taught media and communication science in Berlin (Freie Universität Berlin) as an honorary professor.

In 2012, the Swiss Federal Council elected him president of the new Federal Media Commission (FMEC). Also in 2012 he joined the advisory board of Carta, a blog about politics, economics and digital society. Since 2015, he has been chairman of the Alexander von Humboldt Institute for Internet and Society in Berlin. In 2016 and 2017, he chaired the steering committee of the German Ministry for Education and Research (BMBF) in charge of evaluating the BMBF Rahmenprogramms Geistes-, Kultur- u. Sozialwissenschaften (BMBF framework programme for humanities, cultural studies and social sciences). Since 2016, he has been a member of the advisory board of the «Kartographen – Stipendien-Programm für JournalistInnen» (association Fleiss und Mut e.V.). Since 2017, Otfried Jarren has been a member of the scientific advisory board of the Center of Advanced Internet Studies (CAIS) at the universities of Bochum, Düsseldorf, Duisburg-Essen, Münster and of the Adolf-Grimme-Institute (Marl). In the same year he joined the Scientific Advisory Board of the Institute for Comparative Media and Communication Studies (Austrian Academy of Sciences, Vienna). In 2018 he received the Schader prize for his contributions to media politics and his scientific accomplishments and became a member of the senate of the Schader foundation of the Basel university council.
